message from Professor White



Dear Colleagues

It gives me great pleasure to welcome all our staff into another exciting new year. With Les White still away I have been just keeping my head above water on many interesting management challenges and thank all those very willing individuals who have kindly chipped in to help so constructively during this time. A particular thanks to Gai, Joel, Ben, Dan and Emily at home who have been helping "Dad" remain sane.

I would also like to pass on my thanks to those staff who gave up their time helping with the bushfire response in New South Wales. Hopefully, we have now seen the end of this disaster for many years to come. What with September 11th, HIH, Ansett etc let's hope and pray some peace and stability prevails for the next few years.

On the local front, our Area administration has recently engaged a consultant to advise on the potential for introducing Area wide clinical services dedicated to a particular discipline such as child health. This organisational change referred to as "streaming" brings with it many challenges especially in such a complex and established Area Health Service as South Eastern Sydney. It will be interesting to read of their recommendations in the near future.

At a hospital level, I thought I would spend a few moments reflecting on our Junior Medical Staff and how our hospital is rapidly being seen as an international centre for paediatric child health education. Many of you will aware we have had a long term relationship with the Department of Child Health in Port Moresby to help train their paediatricians. This year we will have two PNG trainees, Jenny Gagau and Wendy Pameh. Similarly, we have regularly recruited overseas doctors to train specifically in neonatology. This year we will have two from England, James Dodd and Paul Crouchman, and one from Malaysia, Vishna Rasiah. Other doctors come to Sydney Children's Hospital for a broader general paediatric experience often to complement their overseas fellowship training. In this category we have: Neil Atherton (England), Andrea Kruller (Hungary), John McAweeney (Ireland), Jason Pinner (England), Evelyn Doyle (Ireland), Astrid Orth (Germany), Ann Maguire (Ireland), Prasanna Shirkhedkar (India) and Brynn Wainstein (South Africa). Meanwhile, Rajiv Agrawal (India) will continue in his rural general paediatric training post at Dubbo with connections with SCH.

SCH is also proving to be a highly sought after location for subspecialty training with virtually every discipline fielding regular expressions of interest from overseas often with their own funding. This year we will have the following overseas doctors training in subspecialties here at Randwick: Hari Ravindranathan (India, ICU), Mazidah Abd Rasid (Malaysia, Respiratory), Sanjay Taparia (India, ICU), Sumit Dave (India, Surgery), Hassan Sharifi (Iran, Genetics), Louisa Wilson (England, Emergency Department), Kamini Mehta (India, Renal), Maria Vitug-Sales (Philippines, Gastro), Rawad Rihani (Jordan, Haem/Onc), Aileen Cokai (Philippines, Developmental), Azam Mohd Nor (Malaysia, Cardiology), Betty Mak (Taiwan, Neurology), David Chiou (Taiwan, Haem/Onc) and Amish Vora (India, ICU). We are also currently negotiating for Sylvio Provenzano from Brazil to spend a year in Cardiothoracic Surgery and to have a regular trainee from Myanmar (Burma) in Plastic Surgery. Even at the Chief RMO level, Jonny Taitz a South African graduate and paediatrician, will undoubtedly bring a range of refreshing new ideas to the most senior position that he will be sharing with Avi Lemberg.

Organising all these individuals to arrive on time, fully registered and ready to go is a major task. The work done by Rochelle Romero and the Chief RMO, Liz Argent, to achieve all this has been outstanding. Their dealings with the Immigration offices, the NSW Medical Board and the various Colleges are a constant minefield of unique and challenging individual scenarios. Whilst we try to offer each of these 31 doctors (approximately a quarter of our Junior Medical Staff in 2002) a very personalised service, I sometimes wonder what it might be like in five to ten years times as the world gets even smaller and the reputation of SCH continues to grow ... oh well, we can meet that challenge when it comes!

Happy new year to you all, I look forward to working with you on these and other challenges as they unfold.

VIDEOCONFERENCING FACILITIES AT SYDNEY CHILDREN'S HOSPITAL, RANDWICK

There are now videoconferencing facilities at SCHR available to all departments for clinical purposes (i.e. clinician to clinician or clinician to patient). The facilities may also be used for teaching and administrative purposes where appropriate. The Oncology Department, who conduct regular clinical meetings via videoconferencing, purchased the bulk of the equipment. The Genetics Department also make regular use of the equipment, while Nursing Services have held three very successful symposiums covering Asthma, Diabetes and Palliative care. At the moment there is equipment available on C2West, which can accommodate around 15 people comfortably. It is expected that early in 2002 the recently installed equipment in the Lecture Theatre will also be available for use. SCHR Departments will be charged for line costs only for meetings held between 8.00am and 6.00pm on weekdays. NOTICE FROM PUBLIC HEALTH UNIT - PERTUSSIS: BABIES MUST BE PROTECTED

With the current increase in notified cases of pertussis in the community, Sydney Children's Hospital, Randwick staff must ask themselves "Could this be pertussis?" when they see a patient with a cough and there is a baby in the household. For the first few months of life, babies who are yet to complete their first three doses of diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis-hep B vaccine can only be protected against pertussis by making sure those people around them do not unknowingly pass on the infection. South Eastern Sydney Public Health Unit has been notified in recent months of cases of pertussis in infants of only two to three months of age. In most cases it was found out later that close relatives or family members had had a cough, probably due to pertussis, before the baby became sick. Overall, notifications of cases among south-eastern Sydney residents rose in the last few months of 2001. Pertussis in older children and adults can often be hard to pick from other respiratory infections or asthma. So having a high index of suspicion is the only way we can protect babies from catching life-threatening pertussis from a parent, sibling, other relative or visitor.

If the doctor suspects pertussis in someone in a family where there is a young baby, appropriate antibiotics can be given to the person suspected of having pertussis to make them less contagious. Antibiotics can also be given promptly to the baby, to reduce its chance of getting sick, as well as to other household members who might be at risk. A number of New South Wales infants died during the last big epidemic of pertussis four years ago, and we must do everything we can to stop these tragedies happening again. Under the NSW Public Health Act, hospital staff, preferably the registrar on the Team making the clinical diagnosis, must notify cases of pertussis on suspicion to South Eastern Sydney Public Health Unit. Notifications should be made by phone to the Public Health Unit's Infectious Diseases Team on extension 28333.
